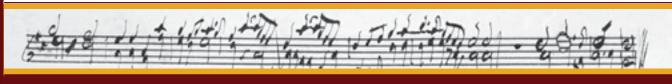

## More Than Music: The Message of Messiah

Each year, Handel's *Messiah* is performed countless times across the country, drawing thousands of people into its music and message. Few works of art in history have enjoyed such enduring popularity. For nearly three centuries, audiences have returned to this oratorio again and again, and many have tried to explain why. Some point to the beauty of Handel's music, others to the strength of the biblical text compiled by Charles Jennens. But perhaps the deeper reason is that this work tells the story of Christ in a way that resonates with every heart.

Handel himself understood this deeper purpose. When asked if he thought he had entertained his audiences, Handel responded, "My lord, I should be sorry if I only entertained them; I wish to make them better." That vision captures the essence of *Messiah*. It was never intended as background music or mere spectacle, but as a work of devotion. Through it, Handel sought not only to move listeners with his music, but to lead them closer to God.

Part the First, which we hear this morning, unfolds the beginning of Christ's story through five scenes. It begins with God's promise of comfort and glory, spoken through the prophet Isaiah. The second scene reminds us that the Lord's arrival brings judgment and purification, calling God's people to holiness. From there we hear the prophecies of a Child who will be Immanuel, "God with us," bringing light into the world. The next scene shifts to fulfillment: the angels announcing the birth of Christ to the shepherds, and Heaven itself erupting in praise. Finally, the Messiah is revealed in His ministry—healing the broken, shepherding His flock, and offering rest to the weary.

Together these five scenes are more than a sequence of arias and choruses. They form a drama of salvation history, beginning with expectation, moving through prophecy and fulfillment, and ending with Christ's compassionate ministry. In music and text, Handel invites us to hear the greatest story ever told, not only as history but also as a living message that speaks to us today.

As you listen, may you hear not only the genius of Handel's music, but also the power of the message it carries. This is the story of Christ, the promised Savior, whose coming brings comfort, joy, peace, and hope. And may we, as Handel intended, leave not only entertained, but better for having encountered this story anew.

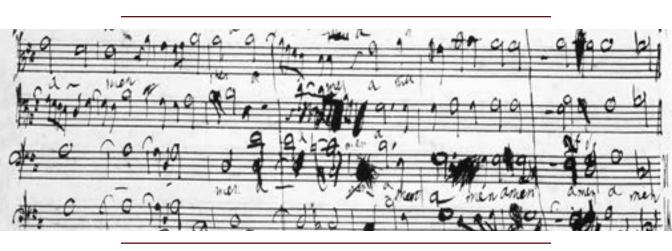

## **OVERTURE**

This type of overture would have been instantly recognizable to Handel's listeners. The opening section embodies the pomp and splendor accorded to royalty, while the quicker fugal section is reminiscent of a dance, echoing the courtly practice of a stately procession followed by celebration. Yet Handel closes in a minor key, leaving a sense of tension. The overture suggests the arrival of a king, but the kind of king and what his arrival portends has not yet been revealed.

## SCENE I A Promise of Hope

The opening scene features prophecies from Isaiah. They speak of a salvation, a comfort that God will bring to His people, but what exactly that comfort is we do not yet know. Handel's music begins in a major key, with the orchestra gently supporting the tenor's words "Comfort ye." The chorus brings the scene to its height with "And the glory of the Lord," a vision of what will happen when God's promise is revealed, and His word firmly established.

## **SCENE II**

## The Lord Who Purifies and Refines

Texts from Haggai and Malachi remind us that with God's comfort comes judgment. His coming will shake heaven and earth, a truth Handel underscores as the bass line trembles on the word "shake." Yet God's judgment is not for destruction, but for renewal. His purpose is to refine and purify, preparing His people for lives of holiness. The choir's voices join fully together in the final chorus only on the words "an offering in righteousness," a musical image of a people made whole, ready to stand before God.

## **SCENE III**

## The Prophesied Messiah

Having announced coming and judgment, Isaiah foresees the birth of a child who will embody God's presence with His people—Immanuel, "God with us." We hear the prophesy of the virgin birth sung almost without accompaniment. The joyful news bursts forth as the soloist and choir celebrate "good tidings to Zion." This is the Promised One who will bring light to those walking in darkness, and the choir builds to a climax as He is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, and Prince of Peace.

## **SCENE IV**

## The Messiah's Birth

Luke's Gospel tells of shepherds keeping watch when angels break forth with the good news of Christ's birth in Bethlehem. Handel sets the scene with the "Pifa," a lilting pastoral symphony whose melodies evoke shepherds' pipes. The story is told simply, until the multitude of the heavenly host appears. Their song becomes the chorus, "Glory to God in the highest, and peace on earth," as the promise of Isaiah becomes reality in the Child born that night.

## **SCENE V**

## The Shepherd-King's Ministry

The final scene of Part the First turns to the Messiah's ministry. We hear the rejoicing that announces Zion's long-awaited King, who comes both as a gentle shepherd caring for His flock and as a righteous King bringing peace to the nations. The final Air returns to the same pastoral warmth of the "Pifa", as the soprano extends Christ's invitation to "Come unto Him" and receive true rest. The closes with the chorus "His yoke is easy," whose lively, buoyant lines capture the gladness of following He who offers rest, healing, and joy to all who follow Him.

## Hallelujah!

Though the "Hallelujah" Chorus comes from the end of Part II of Messiah, it has long been tradition to close concerts with this triumphant declaration. For centuries, audiences have risen to their feet during this chorus, a custom often traced to King George II, who is said to have stood in awe at its first London performance. Whether in reverence, joy, or simple tradition, standing for the "Hallelujah" Chorus has become a way for listeners to join in the acclaim of Christ as King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

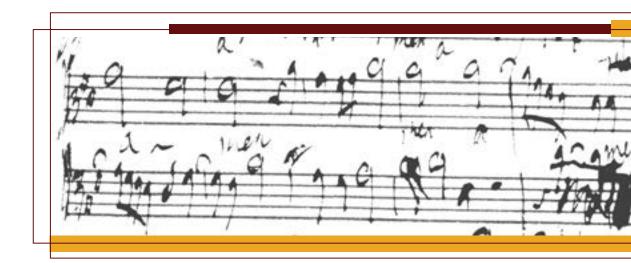
## Talise Trevigne, Soprano

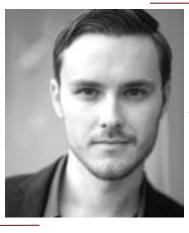

## Austin Cripe, Tenor

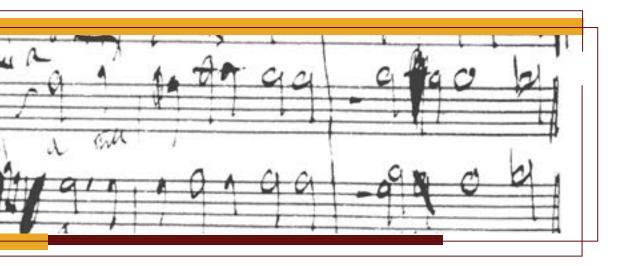

## Selebrating a Fradition of Usuaic and Worship

Festival Choir at Northside began in the late 1980s as a simple but powerful idea: to create an open door for anyone who wanted to sing. In those early years, Mike Moffitt recognized that the church was filled with people who loved music and wanted to participate in worship, but who could not commit to weekly rehearsals. Festival Choir became a way to gather those singers, youth and adults, longtime members and newcomers, for a few focused rehearsals leading up to one major service each semester. What began as a modest choir accompanied by a small string quartet has grown into a full musical experience, bringing together singers and instrumentalists as the music ministry expanded and church members generously supported the vision. Over the years traditions and structures have ebbed and flowed. The group was originally known as the Northside Singers until 2010, when it officially became the Festival Choir. While the Festival of Carols has been a longstanding Advent tradition, the spring service changed shape from year to year as the ministry evolved. Yet through of these changes, one purpose remained constant: Festival Choir was meant to be a place where every voice had a home. The ministry has always sought to balance challenge and accessibility, and beauty with hospitality, drawing together singers of all abilities to prepare an offering of worship for the church.

Today, that legacy continues. Festival Choir invites anyone who longs to sing, whether seasoned or brand new, to step into the choir loft, experience the joy of leading worship, and to find their place within Northside's music ministry. If you are interested in joining this long-running musical tradition, we would love to hear from you. Any choir member would be happy to answer your questions and get you connected to the Music Ministry. Come lend your voice, grow in faith, and join us as we continue offering our best to God in worship.

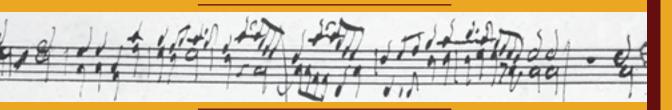
