As Jesus rode into Jerusalem, the crowds rejoiced. They waved palm branches, laid their cloaks on the road, and shouted, "Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" Hosanna! Peace, peace in heaven and glory in the highest.


Holy, holy, Lord, God of power and might.

Anthem | O Sacrum Convivium | Olivier Messiaen

This sacred Latin text, written by St. Thomas Aquinas, reflects on the mystery of the Eucharist. Messiaen's setting captures the reverence and awe of Christ's final meal with His disciples—a moment of intimacy and love before His suffering. The anthem reminds us that in the breaking of bread, we remember His Passion and receive a foretaste of the glory to come.

ANTHEM | If You Love Me | Joel Raney

Taken from John 14, this text comes from Jesus' final words to His disciples. "If you love me, keep my commandments." Raney's setting expands on this familiar passage, offering a message of peace and promise: even as Jesus prepares to leave, He assures His followers that they will never be alone.

My peace I give you, my peace I leave with you, and I will comfort you in times of trouble. And if you love me keep my commands.

Though I may leave you, I will return for you, I'll go prepare for you a place beside me. And if you love me keep my commands.

Because I live, you too, shall live. I bring you peace that the world cannot give.

Reflection | Jesus Prays in the Garden of Gethsemane

In the quiet solitude of Gethsemane, the weight of the cross weighs heavily on Jesus. This anthem captures the sorrow of that moment, yet also the unwavering faith that leads Him forward. As the music carries us toward the cross, we are invited to reflect on our own struggles with surrender, trusting in the transformative power of faith even in the midst of darkness.

The garden lays in silence, while Jesus bows his head to pray.

"My soul is filled with sorrow, please Father take this cup away.

But if this cup remains, I will not cry in vain, Father let your will in this be plain."

Come to the garden. Fall on your knees.


Kneel in the shadows, the shadows of Gethsemane.

Chorale 19. What is the cause of this thy tribulation Chorale 62. When comes my hour of parting

J.S. Bach's St. Matthew Passion is a profound retelling of Christ's suffering. The chorales he employs are not merely musical interludes but serve as a commentary from us, the audience, guiding our thoughts and emotions as we witness the events unfold. Through these two chorales, we are faced with the weight of our own responsibility as we recognize that it was our sin that led Jesus to the cross.

Who was the guilty? Who brought this upon Thee? Alas, my treason, Jesus, hath undone Thee 'Twas I, Lord Jesus, I it was denied Thee! I crucified Thee.

O sacred Head, now wounded, with grief and shame weighed down, Now scornfully surrounded with thorns, Thine only crown; How pale Thou art with anguish, with sore abuse and scorn! How does that visage languish, which once was bright as morn!

Anthem | Behold the Lamb of God | Craig Courtney

Throughout the Gospels, Jesus is called "the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world." The sorrowful music of this anthem stands in stark contrast with its celebratory text, inviting us to remember the cost of our victory—our Savior, our sinless Lamb, for me was crucified.

Behold the Lamb of God, The Lamb for sinners slain; A perfect sacrifices for all, He dies, but lives again.

Refrain: Behold the Lamb of God, Behold His hands, His side. The Son of God, the sinless Lamb, for me was crucified.


He lives—let Heav'n rejoice, And earth her honors bring. To Him, the everlasting God, The great, eternal King. *Refrain*

Why did Christ come? Why did He choose the cross? The answer is love. This anthem weaves together the story of Christ's birth, death, and resurrection, reminding us that every step of His journey was taken out of love for us.

Refrain: Because of love, because of love, He left the peace of heav'n above. He left His throne, His majesty, and came to earth to ransom me because of love.

For God so loved the world He gave His only begotten Son, That whosoever believeth, believeth in Him Should not perish, but have everlasting life.

The cross, once a symbol of suffering and death, has become the ultimate sign of victory. This hymn, first written in 1887, calls us to lift high the cross, proclaiming Christ's love to the world. The hymn's triumphant spirit, reminding us that the story of Holy Week does not end in sorrow but in the hope of resurrection.

As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up. God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son,

That whoso believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life!

Refrain: Lift high the cross, the love of Christ proclaim Till all the world adore His sacred name.

Come, Christians, follow where our Captain trod Our King victorious, Christ the Son of God. *Refrain*

So shall our song of triumph ever be: Praise to the Crucified for victory! Refrain
